# Start Early with Career Services ... Your Four-Year Plan

## NO MATTER WHAT YEAR YOU ARE!!

- Check the Career Services calendar of events and Witt's Happening for programs and interview opportunities
- Refine and **upload your résumé** on the **Job and Internship Board** for access to internships and job postings (contact us for passwords)



- Use CareerShift (part of the Job and Internship Board) to find internships and jobs all over the country (and beyond!)
- Attend various programs and information sessions conducted by Career Services and other experts
- Start exploring in the fall for a summer career related internship--start early to find the best variety of options
- Practice mock interviews with employers and/or Career Services staff
- Attend the many Job and Internship Fairs, most of which are offered on campus
- Explore your options at the Graduate and Professional School Fair each semester on campus
- Join Wittenberg Career Services on: Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and connect with alumni groups on LinkedIn, Switchboard (online) and Community (app)
- Attend Annual Networking Learning and Dining Etiquette Events

#### Freshman Year

- Visit Career Services to discover and assess your skills, interests, and work related values so you can begin thinking about a major
- Don't be afraid to ask questions—talk with career advisors, faculty and alumni to begin exploring different interests
- Get involved in at least one campus or community activity to develop leadership and other marketable skills
- Consider job-shadowing professionals in your potential field of interest
- Take advantage of Strengths Finder activities during FYS course

### Sophomore Year

- With your faculty advisor, confirm your choice of major and clarify program requirements
- Schedule an appointment in Career Services to make sure you are on track with your career goals
- Examine your extra-curricular activities to identify your marketable skills
- Continue to develop your résumé—highlight your accomplishments and projects
- Practice your writing and speaking skills—take courses requiring communication, critical thinking and writing skills, these are critical skills for any career
- Consider using community service requirement as an opportunity to explore career interests and gain experience

# **Junior Year**

- Stay up to date--update your résumé after each new accomplishment and experience
- Join professional organizations affiliated with your field
- Conduct **informational interviews** to develop contacts and gather information
- Investigate graduate school options; talk with your advisor
  - > Gather information on the application process; take graduate school entrance exams in the spring/summer
- Do a **summer research project** if you are a science major or interested in attending medical or other health profession schools
- Think about a job search plan. Take into consideration the market, geographic preferences, financial needs, etc.

#### Senior Year

- Some employers **interview and hire** May graduates during the fall semester; December grads will also have opportunities in the fall
- Create drafts of cover letter for the job search
- Set up your account on LinkedIn; tap into your network for job leads
- Meet with a career advisor to develop a job search strategy and update your résumé highlighting your results
- Practice your interviewing skills through mock interviews in Career Services
- Take graduate school entrance exams and finalize graduate school applications
  - > Obtain faculty letters of recommendation
  - ➤ Even if you are not planning to go to grad school right away, **take tests** during the fall semester—results are good for five years
  - > Work on **personal statement** for graduate school
- Apply for fellowships and/or assistantships
- Sign up for on-campus interviews and use Career Services facilities for phone and Skype interviews
