SOCIAL AND CULTURAL HISTORIAN OF EARLY AMERICA AND THE U.S.

Benjamin H. Irvin, associate professor of history at Indiana University, is a historian of the American Revolution. He is the author of *Clothed in Robes of Sovereignty: The Continental Congress and the People Out of Doors* (Oxford, 2011). That book, which examined the fraught relationship between Congress and the American people, was named a 2011 Choice Outstanding Academic Title and a finalist for the 2012 George Washington Book Prize. Irvin's current project—tentatively entitled, *Independent Spirit: Revolutionary War Veterans and Disability in the Early United States*—reconstructs the efforts of sick and wounded soldiers to eke their subsistence from state and federal disability pensions.

Irvin's research has garnered support from the C.V. Starr Center for the Study of the American Experience, the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities, the New England Regional Research Consortium, the Newberry Library and Jack Miller Center, and the Virginia Historical Society. Irvin has taught at Brandeis University, the University of Pennsylvania, the University of Arizona, and Washington College. He is the past executive editor of the *Journal of American History*.
